Celebrating milestones: Our anticipated family trip to Italy





Pastor's message

"For freedom Christ has set us free...."

(Galatians 5:1)

n July 4, 1776, 13 American colonies declared freedom from British rule.
Colonists united under a new charter, which enabled them to live a new way of life. King George III could no longer impose demands on those living in America. They were free! Similarly, Christians celebrate freedom in Jesus Christ.

In the churches of Galatia, the message about Jesus—specifically the gospel truth of grace in Christ—had become distorted on account of contradicting messages. Agitators insisted non-Jewish men be circumcised according to the Mosaic Law to become full members of the Christian community. The Apostle Paul, however, sought to set the record straight. Christ had set the Galatian believers free from "the present evil age" (Galatians 1:4)! The Law served as a "guardian" until Christ (Galatians 3:24).

Freedom from this present age means liberty from the Law and new life by the Spirit. Those who believe are released from sin and the demands of the Law. Much like Independence Day, the Law no longer rules over the lives of Christians. Now, faith in Christ and life by the power of the Spirit define the new charter for living as God's united people. As we celebrate our national independence this month in America, let us consider the freedom to live a new kind of life in Christ Jesus, which includes love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness, and self-control (Galatians 5:22-23).
